And, finally, dear church, you have shared the gift of the realness of God's love with the world around you. Be well, dear church, and stand steadfast in the promise of God's love and grace as you take that promise with you into the world.

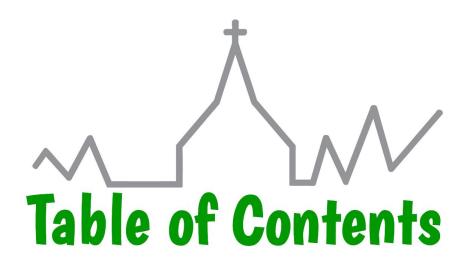

## WINDSOR HEIGHTS LUTHERAN CHURCH 2022 Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes Sunday, January 22, 2023 Crabtree Parish Hall

## I. Call to Order

Tony Dahlman called the meeting to order at 12:33 PM.

## II. Opening Prayer

Pastor Chris led the congregation in the litany and prayer.

## III. Declaration of a Quorum

Tony Dahlman established a quorum, declaring over 50 registered voters present.

## IV. Approval of Agenda

Dennis Graham moved to approve the meeting agenda. Seconded by Tracey Hirst. Motion carried.

## V. Approval of Minutes – 2021 Congregational Meeting

John Ambroson moved to approve the 2021 Congregation Annual Meeting minutes. Seconded by Sue Crum. Motion carried.

## VI. Council President Report

Tony Dahlman shared how hymns have supported his faithfulness, specifically *Great is Thy Faithfulness*. WHLC has had great mercies in 2022. Tony talked about transition with the end of the Health Committee during the pandemic, landscaping work, sabbatical of Pastor Chris and departure of Pastor Robin. Tony thanked all the council members, secretary, treasurer, pastors and staff for their work in 2022. Tony also thanked John Ambroson and Halley Ryherd for their support as past council presidents. Tony shared that the council will have a period of discernment on the pastoral plans. The council is looking at a service event in the spring, Easter brunch, event with the Chin congregation and support of youth events during the year.

## VII. Pastor's Reports

Pastor Chris reported that in 2017 WHLC reduced the Associate Pastor position from full-time to part-time. At the time, there was discussion on a one pastor model. He recommends a wait-and-see approach as we start 2023. A Visitation Pastor role is planned for 2023, and Council will take future action on this position. The Visitation Pastor will commune with WHLC's homebound members once a month, and back-up Pastor Chris with pastoral care when he not available. Pastor Chris talked about one of the shifts in the church with long-term commitments to serve on a committee. A

recommendation received was to move from a standing committee model to a task force/missional project model. Pastor Chris asked members to consider their time to serve in various projects that are brought forth from the council. Examples mentioned were worship volunteers, assistance with Elderberries programs, upkeep and "spring cleaning" at church. Pastor Chris also mentioned that WHLC has something happening at our facility every day of the week, and our ministry of hospitality also requires help welcome and support these groups. A focus of renewal will occur in 2023 related to four tenets: worship, prayer, scripture and service. Pastor Chris thanked Halley Ryherd, Jessica Chance, Sue Crum and Pam Lundell for their terms on council and Tony Dalhman for his term as council president.

## VIII. Parish Education Committee Report

Zach Meyer shared about WHLC's youth ministry. There was an increase in participation and diversity in the events such as LiftOff where 40-50 people participated and the planned Winter Wonderland. Zach is noticing that connecting with families on a one-to-one level on what they need builds the connection and a community. Zach challenged WHLC in 2023 to look at ourselves and neighbors on what best serves this group. Zach thanked the Parish Ed team, including Linda Russell, Megan Siefert, Pam Lundell and Amanda Eakins.

## IX. Recognition of Council Members

Tony Dahlman thanked Halley Ryherd as outgoing past president and shared a message of thanks from Halley for the last three years. Tony acknowledged Jessica Chance, Sue Crum and Pam Lundell whose terms are completed with Council and thanked them for their service. Tony recognized the other members of Council: Sharman Blake, Julie Borseth, Norm Carlson, Tracey Hirst, Matt McNamara, Michael McNamara and Kevin Nicolet.

## X. 2023 Budget Approval

• Two budget meetings have been held over the past couple weeks. Tony Dahlman thanked the Finance Committee and their time for the question & answer sessions. Scott Steensen shared that there was a great finish to 2022, and the congregation brought in \$60,000 in general offerings in 2022. This was above where WHLC finished in 2021. Scott stated that a balanced budget has been proposed. Scott highlighted a couple areas for the 2023 budget: increased interest income, increased rental income, a conversative approach to general offerings. Scott shared that the mortgage stands at \$705,000 and paid down \$225,000 over the last 13 months. The capital appeal stands at \$170,000, which is about 24 months of principal payments. The congregation continues to make contributions to capital appeal, which is very appreciated. The current mortgage interest rate is 4.125% and is set to reset in March 2025.

Scott Steensen moved to approve the 2023 budget on behalf of the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

## XI. Council Nominating Committee Report

The Nominating Committee consisted of Halley Ryherd, Megan Siefert and Kevin Nicolet. Kevin Nicolet presented the slate of Bill Morris, Maren Steensen and president-elect John Swanson.

#### XII. Election

Tony Dahlman moved to approve the slate of nominations on behalf of the Nomination Committee. The two incoming members meet the council numbers required. Motion carried.

## XIII. Installation of New Council Members

Pastor Chris installed the 2023 Council members: Sharman Blake, Julie Borseth, Norm Carlson, Tony Dahlman, Tracey Hirst, Matt McNamara, Michael McNamara, Bill Morris, Kevin Nicolet, Maren Steensen, John Swanson. Barb Waymire and Jill Hyda were appointed and will serve as Treasurer and Secretary for 2023, respectively.

## XIV. Sending

Pastor Chris led the congregation in a closing blessing.

## XV. Adjournment

Kevin Nicolet moved to adjourn the meeting on behalf of Council. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned at 1:18 PM.

## **Lead Pastor**

It has taken me a while to muster the energy to sit down and focus on this report, probably because 2023 is a year that I mostly would like to forget. So much time and energy was sunk into the journey with mom through the final days of her life. Then came a time for mourning, which continues, of course, and a time, a lot of time, for all those things you hadn't really thought about needing to do: cleaning a house, selling a house, closing accounts, administering an estate, and on and on. I am grateful for being able to be away to be with mom as needed, and for your kind and generous support throughout. Our hearts were made even heavier when Beth's father died just a couple of weeks after my mom. It was a lot, and we are not sad to turn the page on 2023.

It was a year of loss for many of you and for our congregation as well. We had about twice as many funerals as average in 2023. You know their names and realize that these beloved ones made significant contributions to our life together. They will be missed, even as their witness lives on. As I presided over these funerals, I experienced a profound sense of gratitude for the ways that each person embodied their faith. I can honestly say that each taught me something about how to live with faith, hope, and love, and I think that is true for their effect on our community as a whole. We mourn their loss and give thanks for their witness, which inspires and encourages us.

In the midst of all this loss, I am pleased that we also managed to take some meaningful steps forward in exploring the intersection of faith and science. I would particularly lift up:

- Our first Science and Religion Sunday
- The Searching for Meaning watch party
- Jill Dopf Viles' brilliant presentation on her work as a citizen scientist
- A broad emphasis on creation and stewardship during the Season of Creation
- Our contemplative nature walk and worship service at Brenton Arboretum

In every quarter of the year we found ways to emphasize that faith and religion can be complementary, rather than contradictory, ways of looking at human experience. In an age when over half of youth and young adults who have left the church say they did so because they perceived religion to be in conflict with their scientific views, sustaining this conversation is obviously important.

It is always worth noting that our building is occupied seven days a week, and what an extraordinary thing this is. Heartland Youth Choir, Easter Seals, the Chin Baptist Church, Girl Scouts, Alcoholics Anonymous, and many other groups find a home here alongside us, all enriching lives and making our community and world a better place. This kind of hospitality is an important part of our mission.

As for 2024, may we continue to be inspired by the many witnesses who have gone before us, and those who stand among us still, to embody faith, hope, and love in our lives. And may we become more deeply devoted to following the way of Jesus and his love, working to unify and bring peace to our world.

## **Global and Community Outreach Committee**

The committee did not meet during the year, but the congregation has continued to support community programs. Members of each community program provided the following updates:

## Central Iowa Shelter and Services (CISS) - Dana Leahy

WHLC provided and served meals to the CISS through July 2023 under the loving and diligent leadership of Dana and John Leahy. After considerable effort by the Leahys to find a replacement coordinator, WHLC discontinued monthly meal service at the CISS. Thank you, Dana and John, for your dedicated, loving service the past several years!

Throughout the year the WHLC budget provided funds monthly for meals. Additional funds provided by WHLC to CISS through member designated giving also continued. Those funds have been / will be sent to CISS. A discussion will be held at the Annual Meeting in January 2024 so that we understand the wishes of the congregation on how to support CISS in going forward.

## <u>Urbandale Food Pantry</u> – Ellen Graham

Urbandale Food Pantry continues to supply nourishing foods to those in need. The need for food continues to increase monthly. Thousands of pounds of rescued food and monetary donations combine with food donations supplied by WHLC and others to meet the growing need. Volunteers, including members of Windsor Heights Lutheran Church, continue to serve at the Food Pantry, and follow city and DMARC guidelines to safely serve folks in need.

## Family Promise

Beginning in September 2020, it was determined that it was best for WHLC to take a sabbatical from previous quarterly ministry participation. It was not known at the time what challenges and changes Family Promise of Greater Des Moines would face due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2021 and 2022 challenges continued, and WHLC extended the sabbatical. Support for Family Promise continued through the WHLC benevolence fund and by making our congregation aware of various opportunities to offer support individually.

Unfortunately, due to financial and other challenges, Family Promise closed in November 2023.

## Windsor Elementary - Julie Borseth

In an effort to assist and support the community where WHLC is located, we reached out to Windsor Elementary, a Des Moines public school located at 5912 University Avenue. Windsor Elementary serves about 300 students ranging in age from 5-11. As a congregation, we supported

- the students by providing school supplies needed by all students. (August)
- the students by stocking a Personal Needs Pantry with items that the school system is unable to provide, but the students need in order to focus on learning. Many of these items are used at home, enabling younger and older siblings to focus on their education as well. (November)
- the teachers and staff by providing freshly baked cookies on a professional development day. (December)

Thank you to all of you for your support and generous donations. Support for Windsor Elementary will continue in the future as needs are identified.

The theme was a ton of fun, many lasting memories were made, and overall it continues to be something we really pride ourselves in hosting at WHLC. It continues to meet a need for the families in our community while being a great way for our students to engage the world around them.

As we move into 2024, our big takeaway from this year is a point we realized during VBS, but can apply to our church in general. While we did raise allocated budgets for VBS & Liftoff in 2024, monetary contributions are not the most important need facing our ministries. Rather, our biggest need continues to be hands-on involvement from members of the congregation. As our ministries expand, and numbers for events grow, we continue to need more support to host and invest into these many students and their families! Anyone can help, and no special talent or skill is needed; just a desire to invest in this awesome group of students is all you need!

## **Foundation Committee**

The Foundation Board met in March and June to review the many worthwhile organizations we have supported in the past, and to prayerfully consider each entity. Unfortunately the 2022 calendar year saw a significant reduction in the assets of the Foundation due to the poor performance of the financial markets. The Foundation's 2022 year end assets were \$527,824. This allowed for a distribution of \$21,112 (which is 4% of the year end assets) in 2023. This unfortunately was a reduction in over \$6500 from 2022 and thus the Board felt it necessary to reduce the funding of several causes and to eliminate the funding of several others. It is anticipated that 2024 disbursements will be higher as the the assets are up to almost \$605,000 as of the end of November.
